Course Start is independent learning you need to complete as a fundamental part of your introduction to the course. It should take you approximately 5 hours to complete.

Expectations for: Art A Level

What this course involves
Completing Planned Study (independent learning) of 5 hours per week. This will be marked and you will get feedback every week.
Completing the Introductory term of skills and techniques - a fast paced programme of exciting ways of working.
Making a Personal Study research project in term 3 researching artists of your choice.
Coursework element 60% of final grade - runs from term 2-5 on your own chosen theme
Exam Unit consisting of a project from given themes over 3 months. 40% of grade.
Engaging in lessons on a variety of topics and skills and trying each task to your full ability, e.g. painting, printmaking, experimental drawing, sculpture etc.
Attending trips to galleries and possibly residential trips to extend and enrich learning.
Developing independent learning skills (e.g. time management, preparing for each week's lessons, completing learning tasks outside lessons)

Course Start Art Project

This task should take a minimum of 5 hours.

Open a drawer or cupboard in your house. It could be your cutlery drawer, kitchen cupboard, bedside table, garage or shed or bathroom cabinet - anything with a variety of objects.

Find an interesting angle with lots of different shapes and shadows.

Use an A3 piece of paper - not A4! Try to make it cartridge paper (thick) and keep it flat! You may wish to put some collage paper down first. If you choose to buy a sketchbook - choose A3 wirebound by Pink Pig or Seawhite (but we will give you one when you start!)

Do your drawing with the DARKEST pencil you have - preferably a 6B! Clean it up with a rubber and spray it with fixative/hairspray if you have it.

Fill the whole page from edge to edge with your drawing.

Look for shadows and tones, detail and reflections. Press hard with the pencil into the darkest shadows.
